

NATIONAL AWARDS 2025

The engage in their future National Awards is a unique opportunity to recognise and celebrate the amazing progress and achievements made by the children and young people from the organisation's network of schools.

Staff members from schools are invited to share examples of the outstanding accomplishments of their children and young people by nominating them for a 2025 National Award.

With nine categories available, the National Awards celebrate so much more than attainment providing the opportunity to recognise and applaud achievements of all kinds. So whilst nominations for progress in the classroom are welcomed, the National Awards is also about celebrating personal resilience, cohesive teamwork, innovation and creativity, being a good citizen and contributing to the world around us.

All short-listed students (usually three in each category) will be invited to gather with family, staff and peers to be presented with their certificate and trophy at the National Awards ceremony.

The National Awards Ceremony is typically quite an emotional occasion as the achievements and progress of the students are celebrated and applauded. A short synopsis of each nomination is read out together with a few choice photographs before short-listed nominee is invited on to the stage to collect their certificate and trophy, and to have their photo taken - no one leaves empty handed.

The National Awards Ceremony has been held at different locations across the country, and welcomed special guests that reflect the inspirational efforts of the students.

Attendance at the National Awards Ceremony is not obligatory, and we recognise that attending may involve long journeys which can be particularly challenging for the children we work with and those travelling with them.

For those that are unable to make it to the National Awards Ceremony, we will always consider alternative arrangements to remotely present the trophy and certificate after the ceremony. Failing that the trophy and certificate will be sent to the school to present, ensuring that the winner still receives their moment of glory.



WHY GET INVOLVED WITH THE NATIONAL AWARDS?

- The National Awards Ceremony is a prestigious and inspirational event only one of its kind which offers excellent hospitality and provides the perfect occasion to celebrate the accomplishments of children and young people.
- It's an excellent opportunity to recognise and celebrate the progress and achievements of your students on a national platform.
- There are a variety of individual and group categories that reflect a wide range of achievements and contributions.
- Every young person and their circumstances are unique, so the context of each nomination is taken into account by the Judging Panel.
- Being short-listed for a National Award can have a positive impact not
 just on the nominee, but also those around them peers, friends, family
 and the whole school community.
- Short-listed winners are invited, along with family and staff, to receive their trophy at our National Awards Ceremony.

CATEGORIES & CRITERIA



Outstanding Personal Progress (individual award).

The winner of this category will have demonstrated above all others, genuine and measurable progress in terms of personal development. There will be clear examples provided of the nature and impact of this development upon both the individual and his/her relationships with peers, staff and/or others within the school or local community. There will also be evidence of measurable outcomes and specific reference made to available pre- and post-measures which may further clarify the outstanding nature of the individual's personal progress.



Outstanding Achievement (individual award)

The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, genuine and measurable progress in terms of achievement. There will be clear examples provided of the nature and impact of this achievement upon both the individual and his/her performance in the learning and/or social context. There will also be evidence of measurable outcomes and specific reference made to pre/post-measures which clarify, the outstanding nature of the individual's progress towards, and actual, achievement.



Outstanding Personal Resilience (individual award)

The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, a genuine and undisputable ability to 'bounce back' from an adverse event or series of events, or to have faced an ongoing difficulty with courage and growing confidence. There will be clear examples of how they overcame the difficulties and challenges in order to achieve a positive personal outcome. There will also be evidence of measurable outcomes and specific reference made to the personal and behavioural aspects which demonstrate the outstanding nature of the individual's personal resilience.



CATEGORIES & CRITERIA



Good Citizen Award (individual or team award)

The winner of this category will have consistently demonstrated, above all others, some or all of the behaviours and attitude of a good citizen. This may include: respecting others and their property; being helpful and considerate of others; a willingness to learn and work hard; striving to always be wellmannered and pleasant; and being actively involved in, and contributing to, their community. Clear examples should be provided of the actions and behaviours, as well as evidence of their impact on others.



Innovation and Creativity (individual, team or school award)

The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, genuine and measurable innovation and creativity. This award can be given to an individual, a team or a school. For teams and schools, they may consistof any number of students, have worked together over any period of time, and have been comprised of the same members or its membership may have changed over time. There will be clear examples provided of the nature and impact of this innovation and creativity and evidence will be provided regarding the unique nature of the project or work undertaken.



Team of the Year (team award)

The winning Team of the Year will have demonstrated, above all others, outstanding cohesion and team work to achieve a specific task or in participation of a specific event. There will be clear examples of the team working together to overcome obstacles, meet challenges and achieve goals. The team may consist of any number of students and may consistently have had the same members, or its membership may have changed over time. The team may have worked together for a few days, a term or longer. The team of the Year will have worked cohesively, supported each other demonstrated consistent or emerging positive team spirit and unity.

CATEGORIES & CRITERIA



International Award (individual, team or school award)•

The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, a genuine and measurable contribution internationally. This award can be given to an individual, a team or a school. For teams and schools, they may consist of any number of students, have worked together over any period of time, though need not have been comprised of the same members for its entirety. There will be clear examples provided of the nature and impact of this contribution and the ways in which the individual/team/school identified, justified and developed their role(s). Evidence will also be provided regarding the unique nature of the project or work undertaken internationally alongside relevant or appropriate feedback from individuals or groups on the receiving end of such a contribution.



Sports Student of the Year (individual, team or school award)

The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, exceptional achievement or progress in the area of sport. This may be a measurable personal improvement over a period of time, success at a single or series of sporting event(s), or an ongoing commitment to encourage the participation, enjoyment and improvement of others in sport. There will be clear examples provided of how the spirit of sportsmanship, fair play, perseverance, dedication and, if appropriate team work, were demonstrated. This award can be given to an individual, a team or a school.



Leavers Success Story (individual award)

This award is in recognition of the achievements of students that have left school to either transfer to mainstream school, enter a further education setting, or take on full or part-time employment. There will be evidence of the progression of the student during their time at school, and clear examples of their ongoing improvement outside of that environment. The winner of this category will have demonstrated, above all others, measurable personal progress and achievement during their time in education and, if relevant, beyond.

WHAT MAKES A GOOD NOMINATION?

If the progress and achievements of a student are considered deserving of a nomination for the National Awards, it's only fair that the nomination itself provide a true sense of that achievement and what it took to get there.

Whilst there is no 'good' or 'bad' way of writing a nomination, and the decisions of the Judges are based only on the achievements of the students, therefore the more information that is provided about the background, the journey and the outcome the better.

But time is precious and writing a comprehensive statement may take a while. So to help make things a little easier, we've pulled together a checklist to consider alongside the award category criteria and the Terms and Conditions.

Does the nomination...

- Provide information about the background of the student(s)?
 We appreciate that there may be sensitive information that cannot be included but having even just a vague sense of the history can help put the achievements into context.
- Identify the challenges, barriers and differences that were faced?
 What were the challenges that were faced physical? emotional? social?
 Sometimes, how obstacles are approached, and how we respond to the consequences, is just as important as whether or not they were overcome.
- Provide examples that illustrate the progress/achievements?
 This could be physical evidence such as samples of work, assessment results, certificates or awards received, letters of thanks or acknowledgement, photographs, and so on. Or it could be examples and descriptions of actions or behaviours that were observed.
- Share the current circumstances?
 Is the journey complete? Are there plans and ambitions in place to continue that journey? Have others been impacted or affected?
